<ul> <li>All children are encouraged to: <ul> <li>develop and use a range of artistic skills including observations, planning, experimenting and creating;</li> <li>produce creative work, exploring their ideas and recording their experiences;</li> <li>become proficient in drawing, painting, sculpture and other art, craft and design techniques;</li> <li>evaluate and analyse creative works using the language of art, craft and design;</li> <li>develop and use relevant specialist vocabulary for topics;</li> <li>gain a strong understanding of the world around them whilst acquiring specific skills and knowledge.</li> <li>Know about great artists, craft makers and designers, and understand the historical and cultural developments of their art forms.</li> </ul> </li> <li>As part of our Art provision at Westgate, we aim to: <ul> <li>engage, inspire and challenge children, equipping them with the knowledge and skills to experiment, invent and create their own works of art, craft and design.</li> <li>Develop critical thinking and a more rigorous understanding of art and design.</li> <li>Teach children about how art and design both reflect and shape our history, and contribute to the culture, creativity and wealth of our nation.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	As part of this planning process, teachers need to plan the following:  • identify and embed the skills that will be taught within each topic. Consider how they will deliver these, ensuring that the children are aware of the development of these skills;  • Relevant vocabulary – identify and ensure that this is taught and used accurately by both staff and children;  • A cycle of lessons for each subject, which carefully plans for progression and depth;  • Challenge questions for pupils to apply their learning in a philosophical/open manner;  • Regular opportunities to share their creations with other members of the school;  • Trips and visits from experts who will enhance the learning experience;  • Link the curriculum to the school's INSPIRE vision and British Values;  • Identify areas of weakness and seek support from the science lead or organise CPD.  As part of this assessment process, teachers will:  • Make observations of the children working in lessons and give feedback in order to progress in the subject  The Art lead will:  • Support staff, as required in planning and assessment.  • Support staff, with CPD and training	Impact is measured by ensuring that children not only acquire the age-related knowledge linked to the art curriculum, but also skills which equip them to progress from their starting points, and within their everyday lives.  All children will have:  A sketchbook in which to record learning, where they evidence all 4 stages (Generating Ideas, Making, Knowledge and Evaluation)  The opportunity to share and discuss their work, as well as to identify their own next steps  A richer vocabulary which will enable them to articulate their understanding of taught concepts  High aspirations, which will see them through to further study, work and a successful adult life.  In addition, we measure the impact of our curriculum through the following methods:  Monitoring and analysis of pupil progress;  Pupil discussions about their learning;  Termly assessment using Insight
